

JEAN-LUC GOES HARD: GODARD REMEMBERED



Inexorably linked to the French New Wave he helped usher in, director Jean-Luc Godard (1930-2023) was a cinematic pioneer who started out as a voracious cinephile and film critic and would end his decades-spanning career as one of the most influential and eclectic filmmakers of all time. A rulebreaker through and through, Godard was never content to adhere to established norms in cinema. Through his devoted fascination with the art of film, he pushed the form past its limitations up until the very end. Varying even within distinct eras of popularity and interests, encapsulating Godard's work in an abbreviated form inevitably leaves masterworks on the cutting room floor. Nevertheless this small tribute to a giant of cinema showcases a handful of his most distinctive works to celebrate a life in film.



CONTEMPT

(1963, France, Italy) Dir. Jean-Luc Godard

A marriage story of epic proportions and one of the ultimate movies about making movies, Godard's CinemaScope masterpiece follows a couple slowly dissolving their matrimony, embroiled in the behind the scenes drama of an ill-fated adaptation of The Odyssey.


